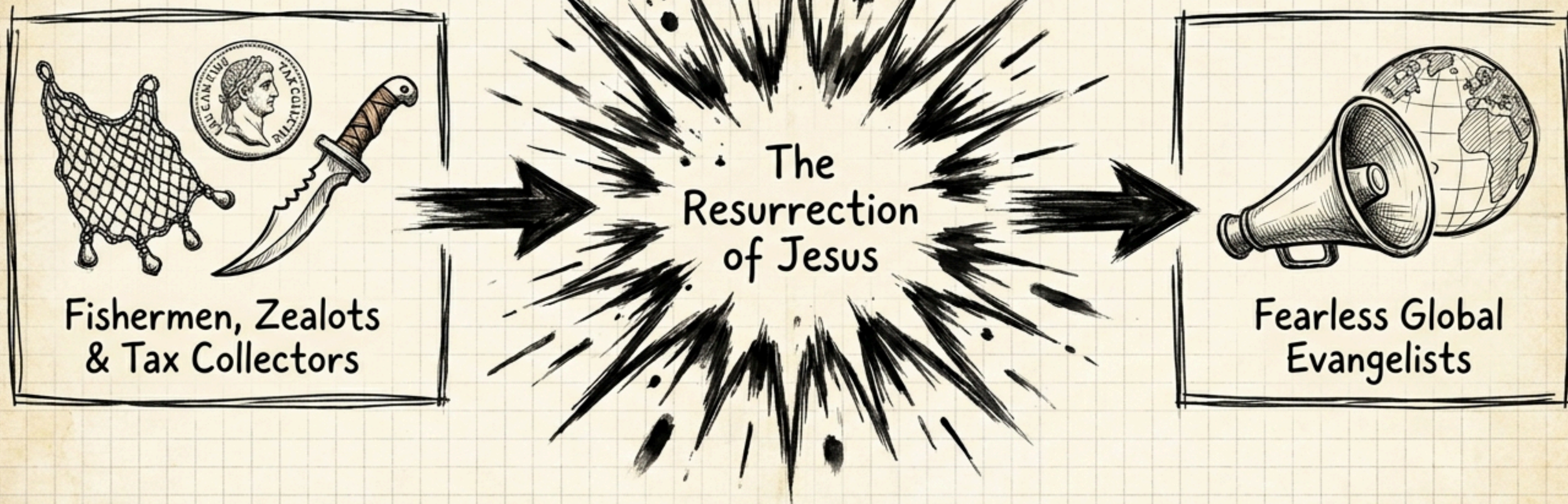


The Faithful Sketches: How the 12 Disciples Died



Following the resurrection, twelve ordinary men became fearless leaders. We trace their final footsteps to answer one question: What does the ultimate fate of these men prove?

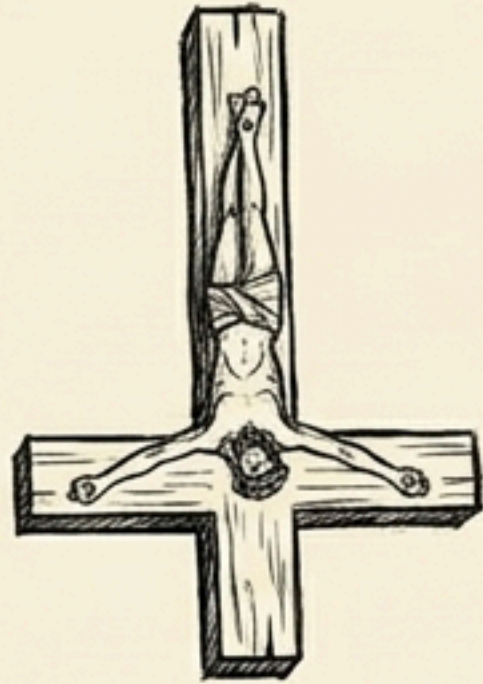
A CATALYST FOR TRANSFORMATION



Peter denied Jesus three times. Yet, Acts 2 shows him boldly preaching to 3,000 people on Pentecost. This sudden, radical shift from cowardice to conviction defined the early church.

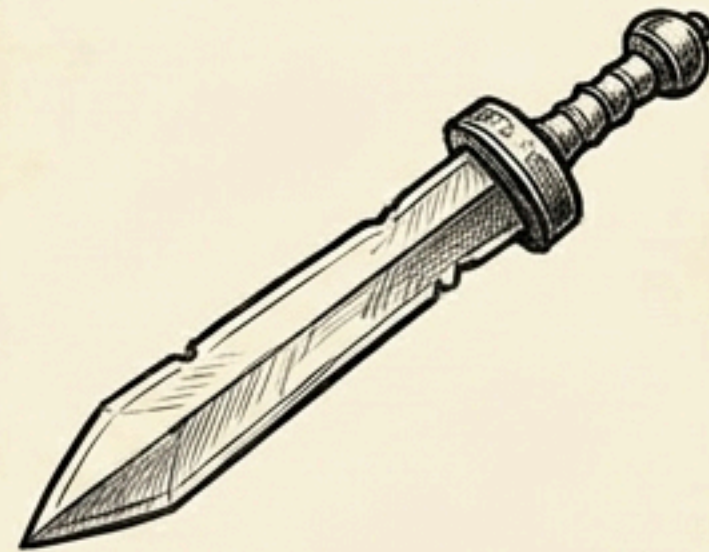
The Inner Circle: Peter, James, and John

Peter ("The Rock")



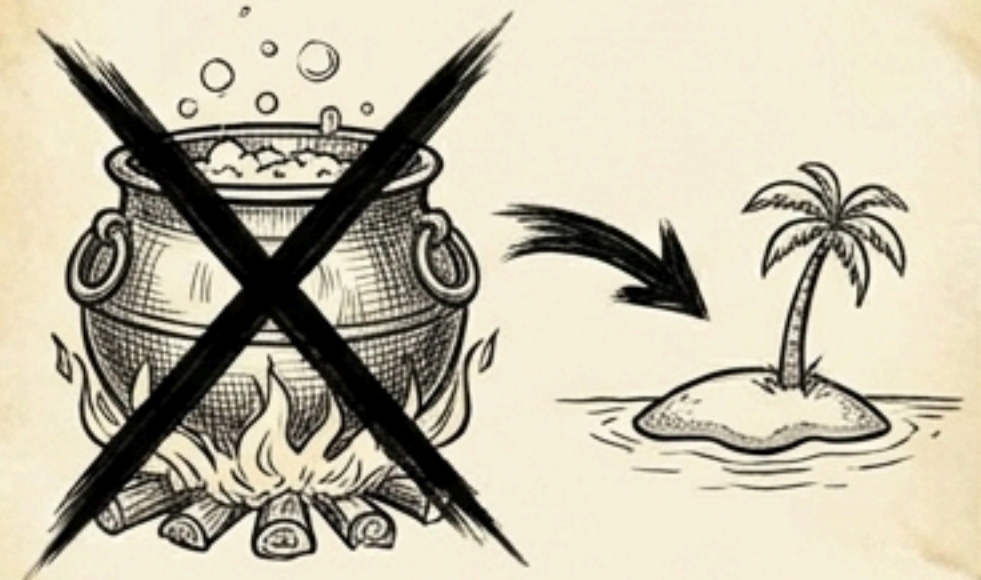
Rome, ~64 AD under Nero.
Crucified upside down by
his own request, feeling
unworthy to die like Jesus.

James the Greater ("Son of Thunder")



The first apostle martyred.
Beheaded by King Herod
Agrippa around 44 AD.

John the Beloved



Survived being boiled in
oil by Emperor Domitian.
Exiled to Patmos, died
peacefully in Ephesus
(~90-100 AD). The only
apostle not martyred.

The First Believers: Taking the Message East and West

Andrew



Crucified in Patrus, Greece. Preached to passersby for two full days while hanging from the cross.

Philip ("The Questioner")



Crucified or hanged in Hierapolis (modern Turkey), ~80 AD, executed for converting the mayor's wife.

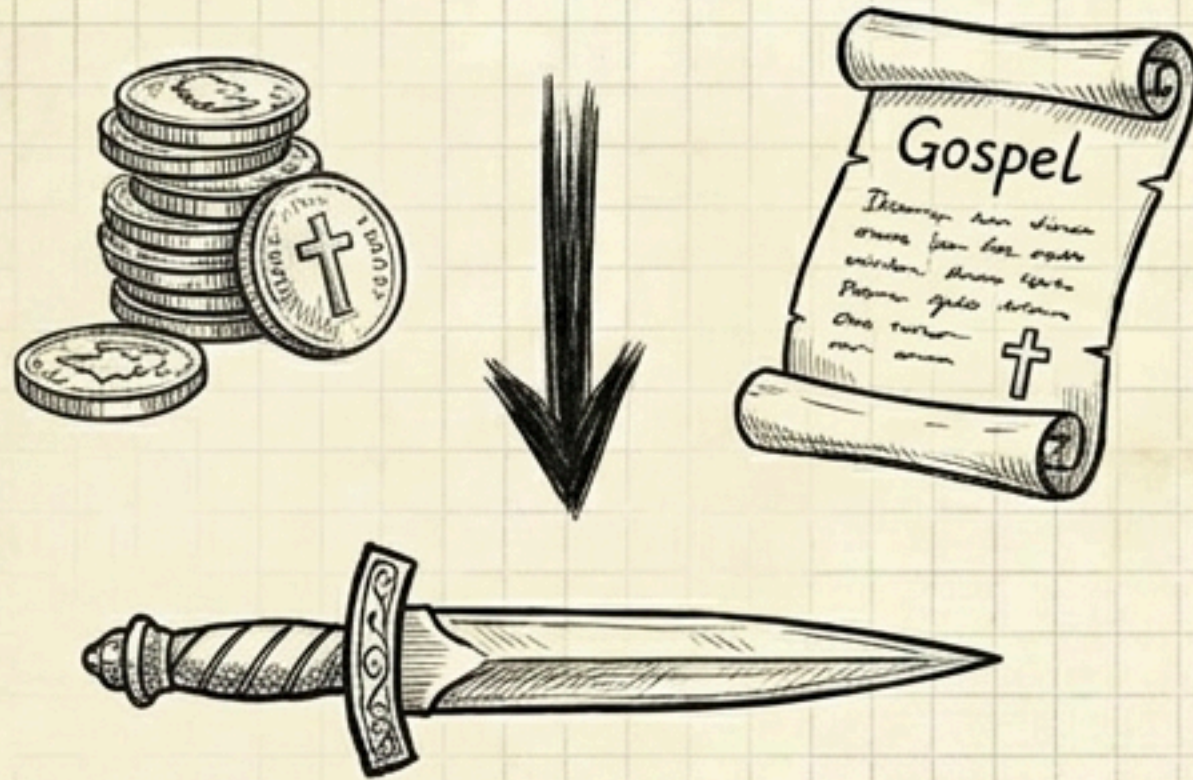
Bartholomew / Nathaniel



Traveled as far as India. Flayed alive and beheaded for destroying a pagan idol.

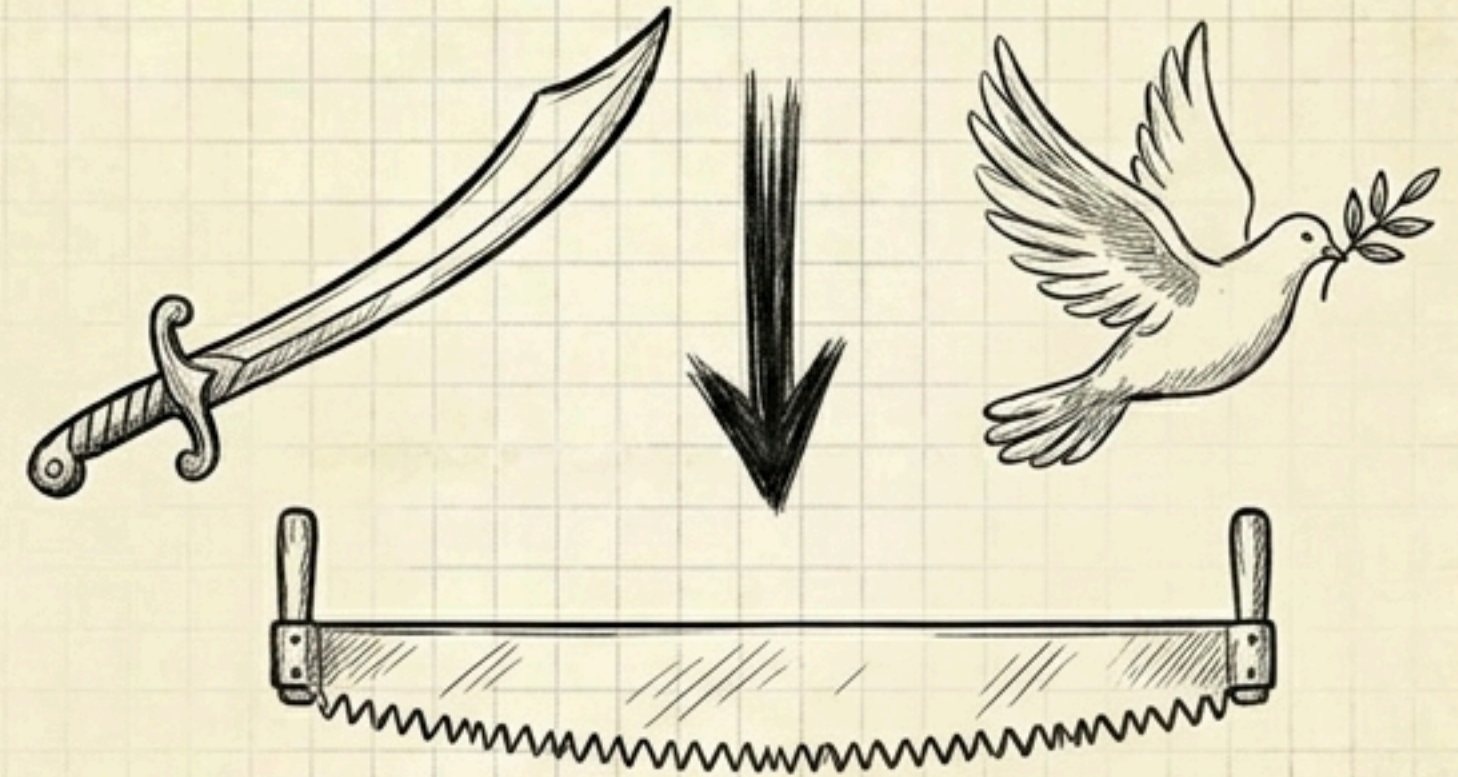
Transformed Outsiders: The Tax Collector and the Rebel

Matthew



Former Rome-sympathizing tax collector.
Stabbed to death in Ethiopia for rebuking
King Herdicus's desire to marry his own niece.

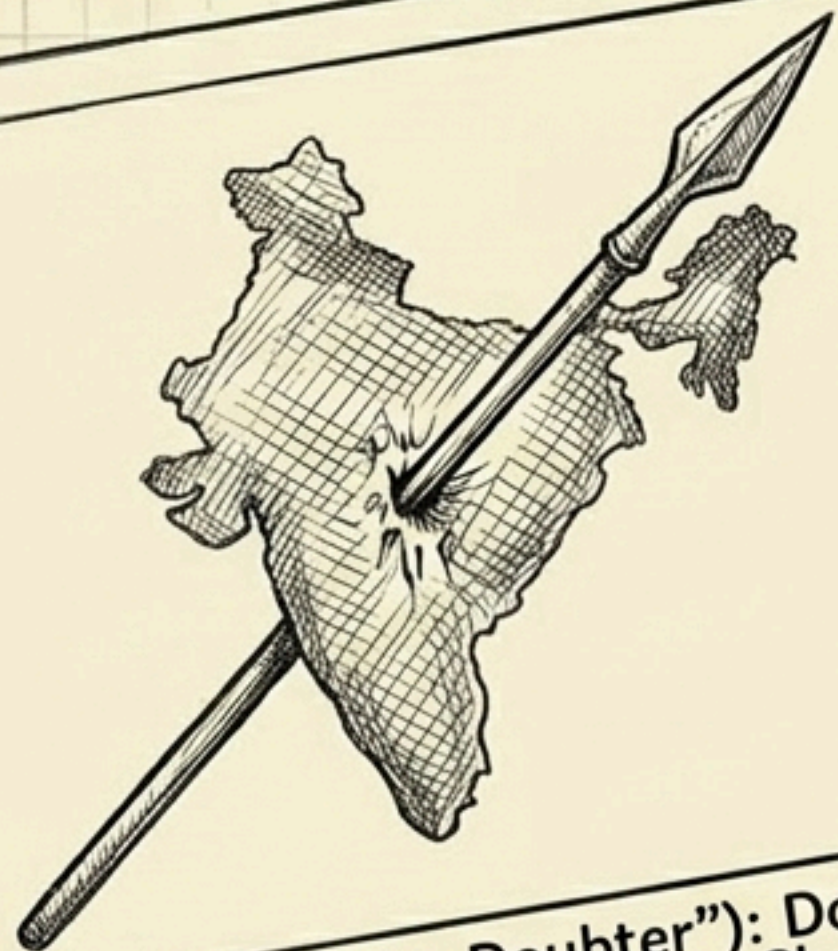
Simon the Zealot



Former violent anti-Roman rebel.
Sawn in half in Persia for refusing to
sacrifice to the sun god.

Political opposites who traded worldly
division for a unified, violent end.

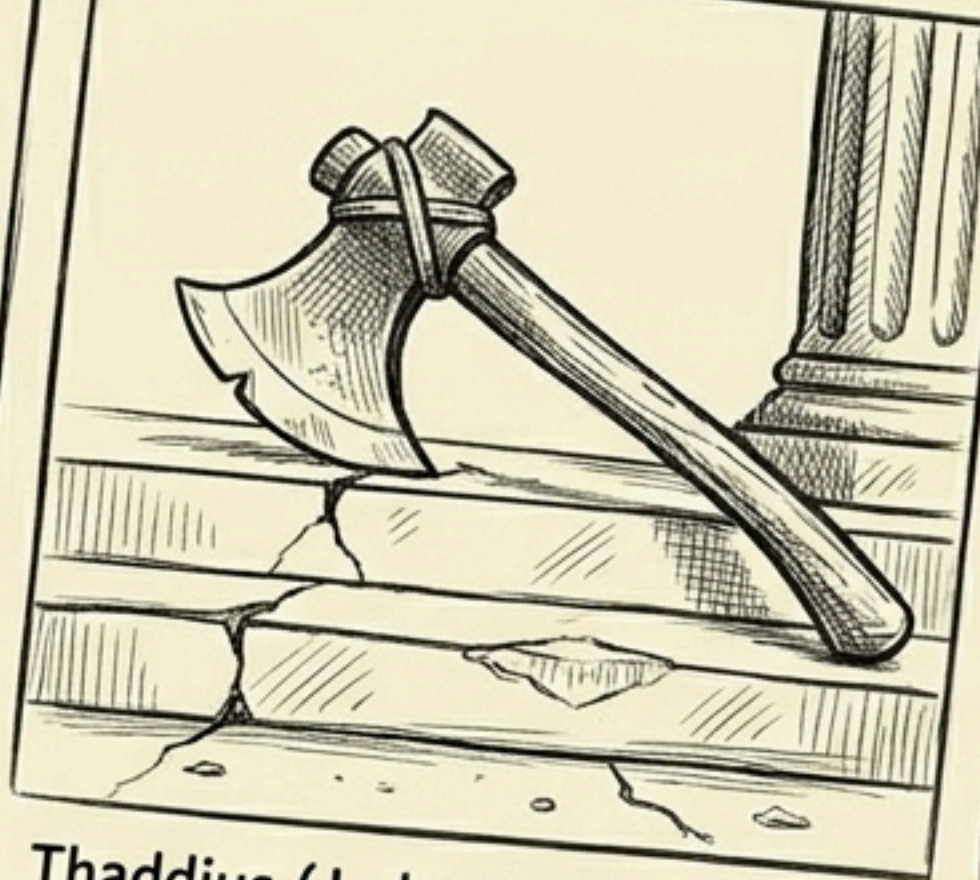
The Skeptic and The Quiet Witnesses



Thomas ("The Doubter"): Doubt vanished after touching Christ's scars. Built churches in India before being speared to death by local authorities (~72 AD).

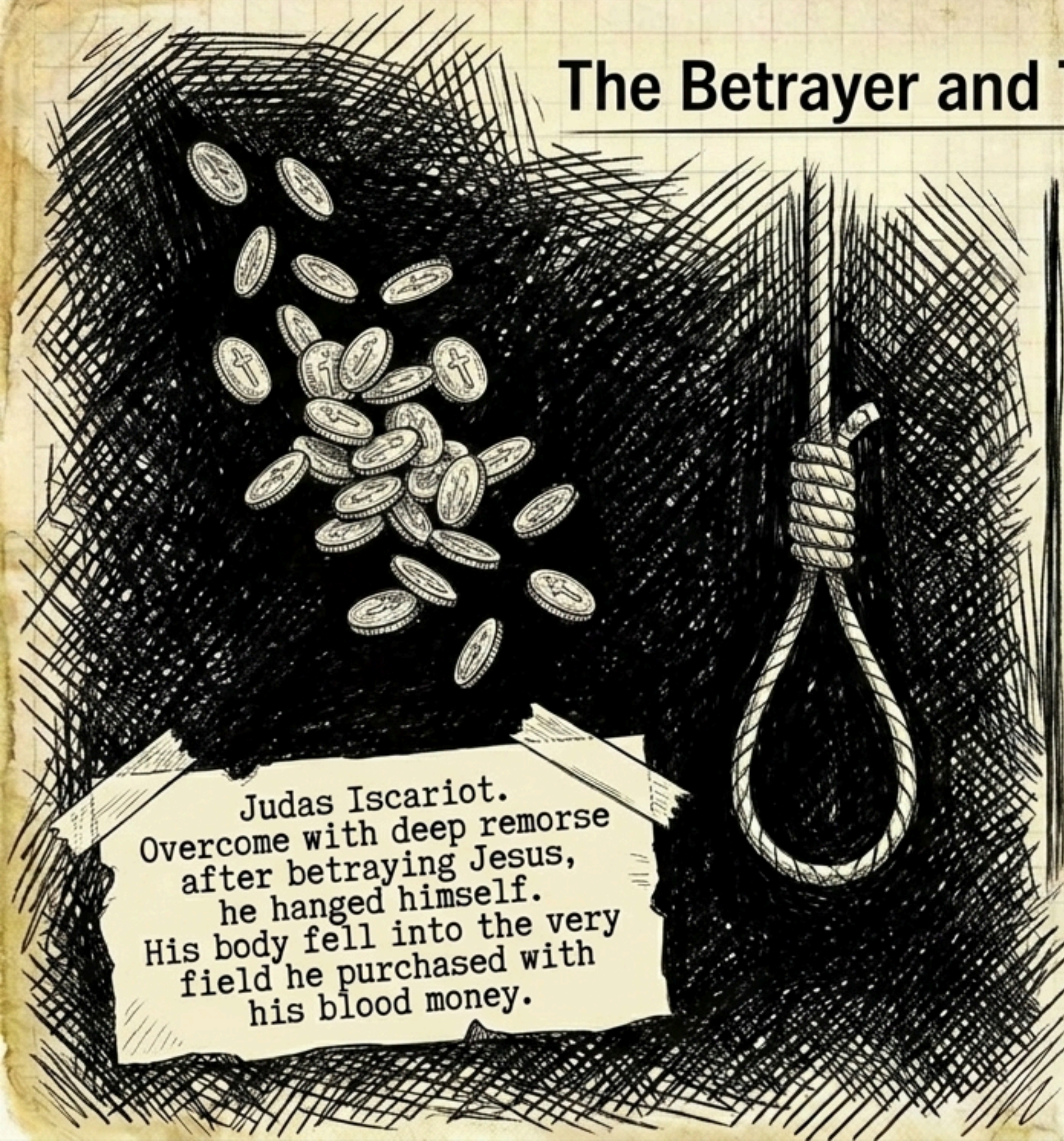


James the Less: Stoned and then clubbed to death for his absolute refusal to deny Christ.



Thaddius (Judas, son of James): Preached in Mesopotamia and Persia. Killed by an axe for converting a pagan king's sons.

The Betrayer and The Replacement



Judas Iscariot.
Overcome with deep remorse
after betraying Jesus,
he hanged himself.
His body fell into the very
field he purchased with
his blood money.



Matthias. Chosen to replace Judas.
Maintained the mission until he was
stoned and beheaded in Jerusalem.

The Apostolic Footprint



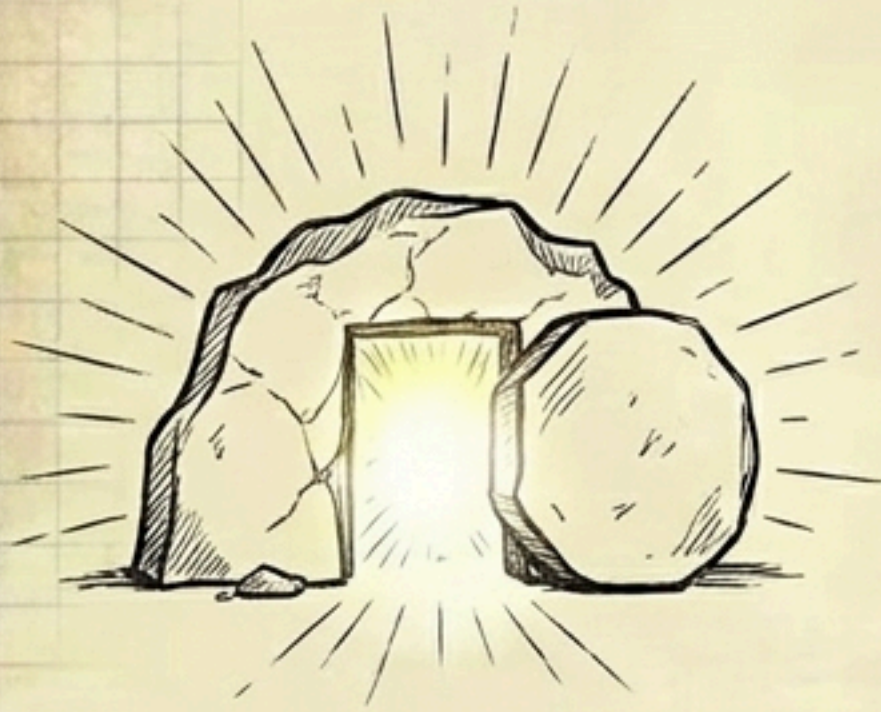
The global spread of a localized event, paid for in blood.

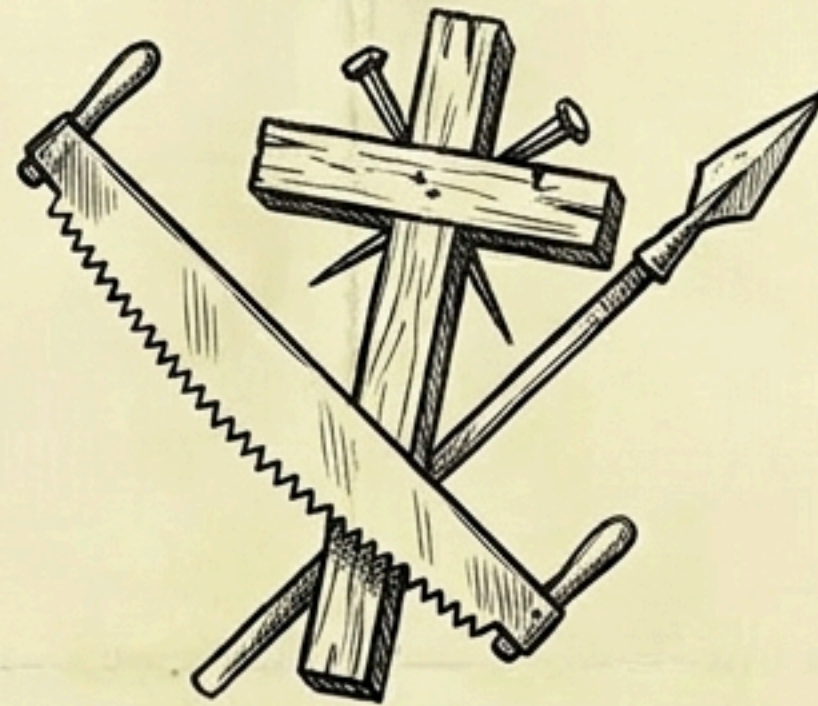

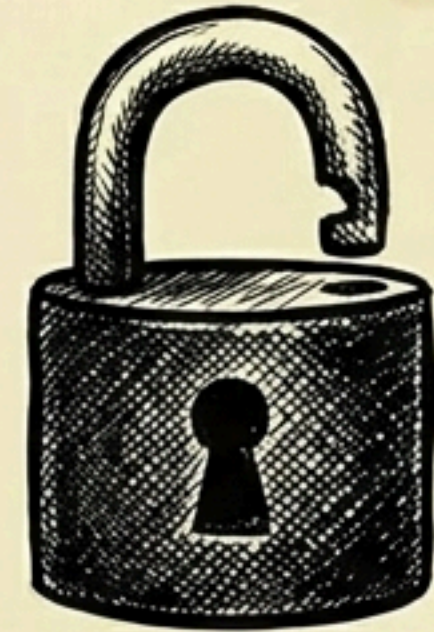
The Ultimate Evidence of the Resurrection
